INFORMATION FOR PARENTS - NITROUS OXIDE (LAUGHING GAS)

Laughing gas, sold in metal canisters, is frequently used as a recreational drug. You may have spotted increasing amounts of these canisters, discarded, all around the village. The large canisters, pictured below right, are used in the catering industry. As such, parents may wish to speak to their children, so they understand the potential risks.

Using laughing gas can cause headaches and may cause anxiety or paranoia; too much nitrous oxide can make a person faint or lose consciousness.

Intensive, frequent use of laughing gas can lead to vitamin B12 deficiency which can cause neurological damage. The most common early symptoms of neurological damage are tingling and numbness in the hands or feet.

Laughing gas is often categorised as a 'legal high' but is currently being reviewed within Parliament to determine if it should be classified as a Class C drug.

COUNCILLORS SWIM THE CHANNEL FOR CHARITY

Councillors Tracy Thorley and Julie Jensen have recently completed their channel swim, albeit over a period of three months and within the confines of Larkfield Leisure centre pool.

They completed the 22-mile distance, (officially regarded as 21 miles) on Monday 19th June by swimming the last of their 1,416 lengths of the 25-metre pool and whilst doing so have raised money on behalf of Diabetes UK.

Although they now have some of their evenings back, they are going to continue to swim weekly, but they have yet to decide whether they will take part again next year. Well done both.


